Pagham Camp, 1927.

The Cadet Corps' Camp, which was held from July 29th to August 12th, was memorable in more ways than one, but chiefly because it was the first camp which the contingent had on its very own.

A retrospect is bound to be rather jumbled : a fortnight under canvas does not encourage the historical method, and many of the chief joys of camp life cannot be put into words, save perhaps by a poet.

Fifty-six Cadets and four Officers set out for Camp on Friday, July 29th. The C.O. and Quartermaster went by road in order to supervise the collection of Camp stores at Hilsea Barracks. They therefore missed the pleasure (?) of going by train, culminating in that rather wearisome march from Bognor Station to Pagham Beach. By the way, how is it that a route march is such an infallible test of character, revealing, without error, shortcomings, not only of the foot, but also of the temper ?

The first sight of the field that was to be their home for a fortnight must have delighted even those who had been tried by the march and found wanting; the long ranks of oat-shocks adjoining, the little scattered camps in the near distance, the trim hedges, and, just beyond, the beach and the tempting sea.

Pitching Camp was a strenuous, but not a very prolonged business. Within three hours we could boast that ours was the best-arranged Camp within the area; and by tea-time we had fallen into a simple routine which lasted for the whole fortnight.

What was the daily routine, you ask?

- 7. 0 a.m.-Rouse.
- 7.45 a.m.-Roll Call and Prayers.
- 8. 0 a.m.-Breakfast.
- 8.30 a.m.-Guard Dismounting.
- 9. 0 a.m.-Fatigues.
- 10.30 a.m.-Parade : Tent and Rifle Inspection.
- 11.30 a.m.-Bathing Parade.
- 12.30 p.m.—Dinner.
 - 1.30 p.m.-Orderly Room (Leave and Bank).
 - 3. 0 p.m.—Bathing Parade. 4.30 p.m.—Tea.

 - 8.30 p.m.-Guard Mounting.
- 9. 0 p.m.—Supper. 9.40 p.m.—Roll Call.
- 10. 0 p.m.-Lights Out.

One or two comments on this routine may be necessary for the uninitiated.

Rouse—as all other Camp happenings, official and otherwise -was heralded by a gong rather more suggestive of a boardinghouse than of a Camp : but, our buglers being limited in number, if not in capacity, we decided to spare them-and ourselves !

Fatigues chiefly consisted in fetching water from a rather far-off well and tidying up the Camp. This does not sound much of a job; but it proved ample !

Tent and Rifle Inspection : Within a very short time a surprisingly high standard of cleanliness and orderliness was attained. There happened to be an inter-tent competition : points were given once a day, and a weekly prize was awarded. "Honoris causa," it should be mentioned, that C.S.M. Carter's tent won the first week, and Corpl. Kirby's the second week. But the task of judging soon became an extraordinarily difficult one. Often the only difference between one tent and the next was that one Cadet had a button only half-fastened : this was reckoned as a condition tantamount to nudity, and duly penalised !

Bathing Parade : Need one say anything about this, the most popular parade (apart from meals) of the day? At least two Cadets learned to swim; and one of the Officers acquîtted himself very creditably in a piece of what might have been called life-saving, had not the victim been only a too-highly inflated rubber horse.

The *Guard* was mounted at 8.30 a.m., and dismounted at 8.30 p.m. It is no use pretending that all Cadets like going on guard. But, with so much Government property about, all had to take their turn; and at least one incident served to show the necessity of this nightly duty.

But the last word has not been said on Routine until mention has been made of "Orderlies." Each tent took its turn not only for Guard, but also for Orderly Duty. The Orderlies were responsible for the whole day's meals. They were the 'Marthas' of the Camp; they helped the Cook to prepare the meal (peeling potatoes, for instance), laid the tables in the big marquee, served the meals, waited hand and foot on the hungry fellows ("Youth must be served"), cleared the tables (and scrubbed them daily), washed up, and did everything that the Cook required of them. Their chief reward, no doubt, was the sense of duty done and the knowledge that somebody else's turn came next; but no doubt they had other satisfactions.

The kitchen has its perquisites; and if ever a small (or even, on one occasion, a big) Cadet suffered from indigestion, it was generally after he had been Dress Orderly : "They also eat who only stand and serve."

A word about "Orderly Room." It was there that the C.O. issued passes for the afternoon and evening; and be it said here that on no occasion did a Cadet overstay his leave. The worst that happened was that sometimes a boy lost his pass—one, it was rumoured, getting his mixed up with an ice-cream and unwittingly devouring it.

The Bank was a blessing without disguise. One small Cadet came to the C.O. on a Friday and said : "Please, Sir, I don't want you to give me any pocket-money till Tuesday." (In other words, he freely gave to the C.O. the power of the purse). Another Cadet—he hailed from a county not far from Lancashire put 30/- into the Bank at the beginning of Camp, and on the last day drew 27/6!

What did the boys do during their hours of ease? Bognor was a three-quarters of an hour walk; it was asking too much to expect many to pay 1/- for a return fare by bus. Consequently there was no rush on Bognor; though, of course, every boy felt it his duty to patrol the place occasionally. The smaller boys sometimes patronised the cinema, as involving not too great a strain on their resources, whether material or mental. Senior boys once or twice, "chaperoned" by an Officer, went to a theatre; and on one occasion a small (in body !) party were lucky in a ballot. There seemed to be an epidemic of detective plays : and yet I doubt whether the producers anticipated our Camp. Edgar Wallace's "The Ringer" contained many a thrill. Who could ever forget that soul-rending moment when the lights went up, and behold the villain gorily transfixed by a mammoth sword stick, with his waistcoat looking like one of the old-fashioned Disraeli-style maps of the British Empire? Or will one ever be able to shut from memory those harrowing moments in "The Joker" when the naughty uncle, minus collar and tie, stepped from the double wardrobe or when the distraught niece scribbled the clue-word on her chest with a piece of lip-salve?

Health? On the whole, excellent. It was a pity that one boy had to go home with chicken-pox : still, he took all of it with him. Another Cadet developed a twinge of an hereditary complaint, rheumatism; somebody remarked that, as he was an Officer's batman, gout would have been less surprising, or housemaid's knee. The acting (unpaid) Medical Officer averred after the Camp that during the fortnight he had acquired a wonderful "inside" knowledge of boys, and that he is prepared to sit for any examination on boils, sprains, warts, cuts, throat-colds and abdominal troubles.

The weather was really good. Evidence, the sun-burnt faces (and backs) of the Cadets on their return. Bank Holiday was, of course, an exception; but it gave rise to a really enjoyable experience, a Sing-Song in the marquee. Our Music Master would have been delighted to see and hear his Community Song Book put to such good use. The Quartermaster made an excellent conductor; and there was at least one good duet!

Incidentally we had another Sing-Song, when our party were the guests of the 1st Penge Boy Scouts Troop at their Camp Fire Pow Wow. It cannot be said that we distinguished ourselves, possibly because we did not know many of their songs. However, we gave them the School Song—at any rate, two verses of it. They applauded so convincingly then that we decided we had better let it go at that.

Each Sunday we had a Church Parade, when a voluntary party went to the Parish Church. Be it said that the service was a very refreshing and inspiring one, specially suited for boys and girls, and the preacher, who was camping himself with his choir, had more than an ordinary understanding of boys. He gave a very thrilling account of St. George and the Dragon.

What shall one say about the food? One does not want to exaggerate; but there is no doubt that both in quantity and in quality it was excellent. Chief credit, of course, is due to the Cook, who was a model of all that a Camp Cook should be. He was punctual; he was clean; his meals were well-cooked and devoid of the usual camp-grease. Some credit, of course, must go to the field ovens. Thanks to these, one had roast, with two vegetables, on five occasions. Nor should it be forgotten that the Officers spared no pains to ensure good meals. Witness the blisters on the hands of two of them, due to carving interminable slices of beef; witness also the fact that they did not get their own meals till the boys were served and replete.

It is no secret that the Quartermaster based his estimates of boys' requirements on his experiences as a quartermaster-sergeant during the war; and his considered opinion—especially when he looked at the bills—was that our Cadets acquitted themselves like men. As for the Officers, the less said about their appetites, the better.

On the day before Camp was struck, Colonel F. G. Poole, Commandant of the Surrey Cadet Corps, came to inspect the Camp. We all realised that this was an official inspection, on which depended the recognition by the War Office not only of this camp, but also of future Camps; and we all realised that, without this recognition—involving as it does the loan of Government stores, cheap railway fares, and all the facilities obtained from being allowed to deal with N.A.A.F.I.—our Camps would be impossible. But there was no attempt at "eyewash": we carried on just as usual. Judging by the Colonel's manner and remarks, there is no doubt that we got a good report.

Is there any need to describe the labours of striking Camp? Suffice to say that we had "Rouse" at the usual time, and marched out at one o'clock, leaving behind us a field scarred by bald patches, and taking with us the happiest of memories.

The C.O. went to Hilsea to hand over the stores—a tedious but necessary business; and consequently did not get home till long after the others. The march to Bognor Station was a more vigorous affair than the first march; and the train journey brought no incidents.

So ended the first proper Farnham Grammar School Cadet Corps' Camp.

It was a really happy Holiday Camp, with just enough discipline to ensure the twin ideals, Service and Comradeship. It taught many a boy to appreciate fully the fundamental simplicities of life, and—by contrast—the true value of home. It taught many other lessons too. Masters saw boys from a new angle; and, in some cases, it was a revealing sight! Boys saw Masters from a new angle—more revelations!

But enough of moralising. Let me conclude with a health : "Here's to the Pagham Camp of 1928! May it be an even greater success than the first of the new series!"

Cricket.

The past season has shown how difficult it is to forecast the performances of a team. We started with two old Colours, one 1st XI. reserve, seven last year's 2nd XI., and a newcomer. The latter, a good fast bowler, proved a great acquisition to the team, for it is some time since we had a bowler with any real pace.

The first few games came as a pleasant surprise; for instead of having, as we thought, a very ordinary XI., we discovered that the team was the equal of most teams of recent years, and much better than some. Here again was shown the value of playing a regular 2nd XI.; and this policy we have again adopted, no doubt with equally successful results.

The 1st XI., taken as a whole, has been very sound in batting, bowling and fielding, perhaps more particularly in batting. On six occasions the team scored more than 100 runs, and in no innings did it make less than 50. Six batsmen obtained an aggregate of 100 or more runs. The highest individual score was 47, by both G. F. Acock and J. C. Kingcome. Yet whilst this is a noteworthy and pleasing feature, we must not forget that some of it has been very slow and tedious. One or two of our team have rather overdone the cautious side of their batting, forgetting that often in cricket it is as true as in football that attack is as valuable as defence. Once again we have been able to demonstrate to our opponents that we are not done with until the last wicket has fallen; for we have had eleven players all capable of making runs, and most of them have on different occasions proved this most conclusively.

The bowling has been varied and good. The four chief bowlers were almost as good as each other, and first and second change brought little relief to our opponents. On only one occasion were 100 runs score against us, and on three we dismissed the opposing team for less than 50. G. F. Till did the "hat trick" against Farnborough Secondary School, all clean bowled.

The fielding, as we always expect, left very little to be desired. D. J. Carter, at wicket, caught 11, J. H. Cooke and B. F. Wheatley 9 each, and J. C. Kingcome 7.

The 2nd XI., composed mostly of young players, has been very successful, but its success has been due to the excellence of the bowling rather than to any great display of batting. The Inter-House matches produced some very good and exciting cricket. Childe won the 1st XI. Cup, with good batting, supported by really excellent bowling. Massingberd's batting was weak, and so they lost the advantage of their very much better bowling. Harding scored well, but had no effective bowlers. Morley improved wonderfully and played one particularly fine fighting game against Massingberd. School were weak, but the junior members played pluckily. The Junior matches were of a high standard and very keenly fought. School won the Cup; Morley, with a large number of very young players, had a most promising season. The fielding in all matches was excellent.

COMMENTS ON THE SCHOOL ELEVEN.

- J. H. COOKE : Led his side well; might, at times, have shown a little better judgment with his bowling; a good but rather too cautious bat; can and should hit more than he does; an excellent field.
- J. C. KINGCOME : Most useful both with bat and ball; young and should make one of the best all-rounders the School has had; did not meet with much success in batting until half-way through season, then ran Acock very close for chief batting honours.
- D. J. CARTER : Kept wicket with judgment; a greatly improved bat with a good style; did not get the success he deserved.
- G. F. ACOCK : A good opening batsman; rather too cautious; weak with rising off-ball; scored a record aggregate; won the Bat.
- G. F. TILL : A really good fast bowler; must remember length is as valuable as pace; a disappointing batsman; has appearance and wrists of a good batsman but no foot-work; won the Ball.
- J. D. GRAY: A good length bowler; a useful bat but needs to cultivate strokes other than those on the leg-side; a good field.
- R. G. WARREN: The surprise of the season; a good slow bowler of excellent length; developed into a hitter of power and judgment; fielded excellently.
- B. F. WHEATLEY: A splendid field; too much lacking in selfcontrol to make a successful batsman or bowler, but has possibilities of becoming both.
- C. SMITH: Started in great style, but suddenly fell off; lacks judgment both in fielding and batting; is a trier and shows promise in bowling.
- V. Dyson: Won his place on account of his excellent fielding; too stiff and cramped to make a good bat.
- L. C. ANDREWS: Came into team as twelfth man; improved greatly and gave most promising display with both bat and ball; somewhat slow in the field.
