NEWS OF THE OLD BOYS

At the end of November 2019, the Farnham & District Museum Society organised two lectures at the Garden Gallery at the Museum of Farnham entitled "Characters of the Town". The organiser was Pat Heather, generally regarded as the major historian of Farnham, and after introducing the lectures she handed over to a small number of people to select and talk about people they considered as "characters".

The Editor of The Farnhamian was asked to speak for 20/30 minutes and his choice was former Headmaster of the Grammar School, George Baxter. Not only did George take over successfully from the legendary F.A.Morgan, but he expanded the buildings and intake of the School.

As well as being Head he involved himself in the town of Farnham and sat on many organisations, was a governor to several schools, and well respected in the town generally. In 1973, when the Labour Government decided to ban Grammar Schools, George resigned his position at FGS and worked for the county in an advisory capacity. He became more involved in the Old Farnhamians and was highly thought of. In later years

he became a customer of the editors' by having Meals On Wheels and we spent quite some time discussing the School and Education in general. He was quite a character!

The final magazine left unanswered the fate of one of our most famous Old Boys. **TERRY HUGHES (1953-1958)** lived in Montecite in America, which was devastated by floods and mudslides, and we wondered if he had escaped uninjured, since his home was sited at what might be termed 'ground zero'. Another Old Boy, **JOHN DAVIS (1958-1965)** was in touch with Terry and promised to investigate for us.

Mid December 2019 we heard from John that he had finally contacted Terry. Over a telephone call Terry explained that he had not lived in Montecite for ten years and therefore had not been affected by the floods and mudslides of the time. He and his wife lived in Santa Ynez, a valley some twenty miles north of Santa Barbara. Beautiful area, with many wonderful wineries.

Terry is pushing 80 years of age and is still working in the field of entertainment with his friend Matt Le Blanc.

During the phone call he said that he owed his career to Alan Fluck, former Music Master at the School. He has great memories of the Grammar School, including boxing for Childe House.

The couple plan to meet in the new year and will send to the editor an update on their careers and hopefully a photograph of the occasion.

NEWS FROM FARNHAM COLLEGE

Early in December (2019) the College held a special lecture giving the students an insight into the coming General Election. Representatives from the three major political parties were asked to take part and begin their talk with the detail of their party manifesto.

Farnham were lucky to attract the Liberal Democrat candidate for South West Surrey, Paul Fellows, the Conservative candidate and current Member of Parliament Jeremy Hunt, and the Labour candidate Tim Corry was represented by Natasha Fletcher and Dave Shurlock.

The Performance Hall at Morley Road was packed with over 200 students. Each speaker stressed the importance of voting and democracy and gave their reasons why they would serve the local area better than the other candidates.

The event proved fruitful for both speakers and students, with the candidates trying to attract young people who will be voting at the next election and the students a taste of politics in this country. Student, Joe Murphy, said that the lecture had made a large impact on him. "I thought the hustings event was a great opportunity to speak to the candidates and get our voice heard."

College Head of Campus Neil Brookes, said, "Ensuring that every young person understands the democratic process and knows their right to freedom of speech and to express their views, is a key component of the College's duty to embed British values into our curriculum".

"I was so impressed with the questions from our learners to the candidates and everyone involved really valued the opportunity."

At the end of the lectures the students were asked to place a vote for the candidate who had impressed them the most. The Liberal Democrats obtained 56% of the vote, the Conservatives obtained 22.5% of the

vote and the Labour Party represented by Natasha Fletcher and Dave Shurlock obtained 19% of the vote. A few days after the event the national poll did not reflect this result at all.

At the time of writing, the format for the Awards evening for 2020 has yet to be determined and those Sponsors contributing will be contacted as soon as further information is available.

OBITUARIES:

CYRIL TRUST & ROGER EDGELL

The first name to be recorded on the new style Newsletter is that of **W.R. (BILL) KING (1938-1942)**. Bill was a member of Massingberd House and researching his school record shows that he did not excel at any sport and achieved nothing exceptional academically. However, he was a popular Old Boy and until recent years attended the various functions of the Association. Roger Edgell recalls that Bill once owned a Haze Grey Morris 1000 which Roger purchased from Tilthams of Ash as his second car in 1968 – the logbook stated that Bill was the previous owner.

One of our most well-known and successful Old Boys was **JOHN CHUTER (1935 -1941)**. John died a few days before Christmas at his home in Frensham. He entered the Grammar School during wartime and soon showed that he was successful at many sports and also academically. He was a member of Childe House and during his time at the School was captain of the School Cricket Team, played football for the School Second XI, was a member of the House Rifle Shooting Team and finally became the School Captain.

In 1943 he joined the 2nd Lothians and Border Horse Yeomanry and fought at the bloody battle of Monte Cassino. After serving in Italy and Africa he came back home and entered Goldsmiths Teachers Training College. He was lucky enough to be asked to join Frensham School. In 1952 he married and moved to what is now Waverley Abbey School. In 1969 he moved to Rodborough School and retired in 1982.

John became a Waverley Borough Councillor and Frensham Parish Councillor. He was a member of the bowls club for many years and also a steward for the l'Anson Cricket League. He belonged to Probus, Old Farnhamians and Frensham Local History Group.

In mid-January we heard of the death of **R.I.(DICK) HILL (1955-1962)**. Dick was a member of Harding House and belonged to a team of excellent athletes at the School He regularly featured as one of the top ten in the annual cross-country races. In 1961 he became vice-captain of the School Cross Country Team and in the same year was elected School Cricket Captain. He was also a member of the School Football First XI

In 1961 he was appointed Prefect and was considered a highly successful pupil both academically and in his **sporting** endeavours.

DOES ANYBODY REMEMBER THE SCHOOL PRAYER

At the 1998 Annual Dinner George Baxter, the former Head of the Grammar School, had a short conversation with one of his old pupils, **MARK BOOKER (1964-71)**, who now lives in Kent. They discussed the School Prayer that was used at assemblies most mornings and the origin of the text, and neither knew a great deal about it. To both of them even the words were hazy, and Mark followed up the meeting by sending to his former Head the wording he recollected. The version both Mark and George feel was correct is as follows;

School Prayer

Oh Lord, the resurrection and the life of them that believe who art always to be praised, as well in the living as in the dead;

We thank thee for our founder William Edington and all our benefactors, John Childe, John Harding, Henry Massingberd and George Morley through whose goodness we are brought up here for the attainment of Godliness and good learning;

Keep we beseech thee O Lord, us they children, from all uncleanness, untruthfulness and cowardice and give us grace to grow up into honourable men;

For Thine is the Kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever;

AMEN

Perhaps a reader could advise Roger whether this text is correct and who wrote the prayer and in what year?

From the 1912 First Farnhamian

ROGER EDGELL

Dr. Harding of Frensham left money by will in 1611 to an already existing School. Other benefactors about that time are George Morley, Bishop of Winchester (1662-84); John Childe, a gentleman of Farnham; and Henry Massingberd, who, originally a poor boy of the town, became a rich London Merchant.

Recent generations of boys will remember the names of these Founders in the School Prayer.

On the subject of The School Prayer – Covid 19, having seriously affected Remembrance Day activity enabled Roger Edgell to place crosses for former pupils of FGS who fell in the two World Wars in the foyer below the Memorial Tablets in Morley Court – this is the main entrance that you all knew to The School above the School Steps – see photo below – our thanks to The College for allowing us to do this as an act of Remembrance in such an unprecedented year.

Our diligent Webmaster **IAN SARGEANT** continues to place material on the website and readers might appreciate knowing about a couple of fairly recent exchanges with OFA Members:

- **MARK LAMBERT**, son of **FRANK LAMBER(1934-38)** contacted Ian about his father and Ian was able to highlight Frank's contributions to School Life, which in his time was that of a most bright pupil and School Captain. For readers Mark provided Ian with a resume of his recollections of Frank's life: He recalls "Frank was a very private man and not one to volunteer unprompted information about himself, even to his own children! However, he was clearly very proud to be awarded a county scholarship to go to FGS, and greatly enjoyed his time there. He attended several reunions before he died in 2005. I found him in one the photos he donated - 1939. This was his last year at the school when he was school captain, and he is seated in the middle where the "important people" all seemed to be. Not a naturally frivolous or jokey type, in the photograph he is wearing a rather serious expression which he would have felt appropriately represented the solemnity of the occasion and the seriousness with which I believe he would .have regarded his role and responsibilities at the school. He certainly was sporty - I have a large collection of his diving medals dated from 1933, and one of the few stories he did tell me about was losing a boxing match to great rivals, Guildford. He went on to study chemistry at Queen Mary College, but as Mile End Road was a favourite target of the Luftwaffe, his class was evacuated to Cambridge and he was "billeted" at Kings College. He met my mother Peggy at Bletchley Park. She was a Wren and a fast, accurate touch typist responsible for transcribing encrypted German codes into Turing & Flowers electronic computer, Colossus. What Frank was doing at Bletchley is, unfortunately a secret that I will probably never discover, but I think I can make a guess that it some form of activity that helped the war effort."
- **DAVID PARKER (1966 – 73)** advised Roger and Ian that he was in the process of digitising colour slides of his cruise on the SS Nevasa in 1970 and some of these featured former FGS contemporaries – David has kindly offered these to Ian for the website so if you recall this event, please access the website where, in due course, you will find a record of the times – thank you David & Ian.

Martin Collyer, brother of **GRAHAM COLLYER (1955 – 60)**, emailed Roger Edgell about the School Reports of their Father **JACK COLLYER (1920 – 25)** – having scanned them all Martin wanted to make them available as a contribution to the memorabilia collection being set up at the College.

The reports show that the Headmaster at commencement of Jack's time at the School was Captain JR Stickland and FA Morgan was the Headmaster when Jack's time at FGS was at a close; these will be available to view in due course in Room 304 Morley Court, Farnham College.

As a thank you, Roger forwarded the final Magazine produced by Cyril Trust to Martin and Graham and Martin ensured that Graham's email address in France was made available to Ian Sargeant since Graham is a website member.
