A Visit to Paris.

The first thing that strikes a visitor to Paris is the number of taxis. They seem to fill the streets. Many tales are told of the recklessness of the Parisian driver, but I found him nearly as careful as his London cousin—and even less eager to give change.

Paris is built on a definite plan in the form of an oval, and is therefore more easily explored by the visitor than is London. On the other hand, although it has many fine and beautiful buildings, it doesn't seem to have had so great a past as London. Places like the Bastille are only remembered as a name. The Louvre, however, has not lost any of its beauty and grandeur; one can wander from one end of the vast building to the other admiring the pictures and architecture, and, if it were not for aching feet, begin all over again.

One of the most lovely buildings in Paris is L'Eglise de la Sacré Cœur, a beautiful church in Montmartre of artistic fame. The church stands on a hill, from which a magnificent view of the City is obtained. The best view of all is from the famous Eiffel Tower, or Tour Eiffel, as my friend called it. One goes up in a series of lifts, all packed with perspiring humanity, and from the top the gardens below seem turned into mosaic floors and the people into ants. Another impressive view of Paris is obtained from the top of the Arc de Triomphe, the meeting place of several avenues, one of them the famous Champs Elysées. Beneath the Arc de Triomphe is the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior, and before it burns a perpetual flame as a symbol of Liberty and Hope.

No account of Paris is complete without mention of the Bois de Boulogne, which corresponds to our Hyde Park, but is much more beautiful. In the 16th and 17th centuries it was a

hunting ground for the king, but it is now a pleasure resort for thousands of Parisiens.

One of the most interesting features of Paris is the open air café. It is to the café that one goes to hear the news and to sift the true from the false in gossip; and it is interesting to know that the public first heard of the R 101 disaster on the Sunday morning before the newspapers were on sale.

I have already mentioned "La Sacré Cœur," and there are many more beautiful and interesting churches. One of them, La Sainte Chapelle, has the curious feature of two floors, and contains very beautiful blue windows. Notre Dame, apart from the porch, is rather ugly. (We accept no responsibility for statements made by contributors.—Ed.). Other buildings of note are the Madeleine, L'Hotel des Invalides, and the Palace of Luxembourg, but my allotted space is full, and I will leave them for another occasion.

A Farnhamian Abroad.

For weeks before the actual event I had been listening with awe to tales of channel crossings recounted to me by hardened and experienced travellers. Their stories did not make me anticipate with joy my first journey across the waters, and the result was that when I stepped on board the steamer at Southampton it was with a feeling of some apprehension.

But after falling asleep about midnight I remembered (and felt) nothing more till I awoke at 5 o'clock in the morning, and going up on deck, found myself near the shores of France.

Events now moved rapidly. Passports were stamped. Then a most exciting interview with a Customs Officer; a bus ride to Havre Station, and I settled down to three hours ride to Paris.

Arriving at St. Lazare, I spent an interesting half-hour searching the station for my suit-case, and having found it, got into a taxi, whereupon followed the most hazardous and adventurous ten minutes of my life. Anyone suffering in the slightest degree from nerves has only to take a ride in a Paris taxi. The cure is guaranteed permanent.

After another long train journey I reached my destination. I arrived just at the opportune moment to take a meal. Certain vague recollections of frogs and snails lingered in my mind, but I fortified myself with the knowledge that the people there seemed fairly civilised, and not likely to indulge in such delicacies. All went well till the end of the meal, when a large plate was brought in piled up with—snails! These everybody commenced to devour with obvious relish. It took me some time to overcome my natural aversion to such articles of diet, but in the end I managed to get one in my mouth. I was surprised. My advice to anyone who is offered snails is to shut your eyes and eat one. The taste is not at all bad to the English palate.

Frogs I never saw during the whole of my stay. They are

apparently a greater delicacy even than snails.

For a person staying in France for the first time it takes about a week to get accustomed to the way of living; it usually takes longer than this to get into the way of speaking the language with any degree of fluency. It was thus about a week before I began to get about and see things. Most of the scenery in Louraine takes the form of ancient châteaux, which are interesting chiefly because of the terrible instruments of torture which are always found. One of the guides pushed reality to the extreme limit by locking us for two minutes in a pitch black dungeon. Two minutes is insignificant compared with twenty years, but that two minutes seemed long enough!

For a month I attended classes, and it was then I experienced a custom which I believe would be somewhat irksome to the average British school-boy. The usual hour for

starting work in the morning is 8 o'clock, and they carry on, with short interruptions, till 6. There are no organised games. Secondary Schools are a little better off, but not much.

With so much to occupy my time six weeks soon passed, and after a farewell feast of snails I began my journey home. All passed uneventfully till I reached Havre. Remembering the journey over, I embarked with some degree of confidence, which lasted till we got out to sea. But when one or two waves came over the deck, things became more unpleasant, and—well, what happened afterwards is best left undescribed!

One last word. Never laugh at anyone for being seasick. You may have to go through it yourself some day.

THE GARDEN PARTY.

First, let me remind anyone who may be forgetful of the objects of this function. It was to be the Summer Re-Union of the O.F.A., and at the same time it was to be a means of raising funds for the conversion of an additional playing field in memory of the Old Boys who fell in the Great War. It is proposed that this field shall be used both by the School and by the O.F.A. Some who had taken forethought stuck to their posts in the pavilion, while other hardier people, showmen, remained in the open and defied the weather. Anyhow, everything was ready when Mrs. Anderson very graciously cut a silk ribbon, announcing the Garden Party open. A happy departure from custom was made when the Captain of the School presented Mrs. Anderson, not with the usual bouquet, but with a fan of ten treasury notes for the Castle Fund. Mr. R. W. Mason had previously explained the purpose of the gathering and welcomed the visitors, and now Major Anderson replied, expressing his wife's pleasure at the welcome addition to her fund.

The weather was still rather damp, but as the afternoon wore on considerable fine spells were experienced, and there was a cheerful bustle of business all the time. Hard was the task of anyone who proposed to patronize every stall and visit every entertainment; as hard indeed is my task to enumerate every activity and every helper. The task, in fact, is an impossible one and no attempt will be made to be exhaustive. Suffice it to say that the helpers were very numerous and were drawn from the Boys, Masters, Old Boys, Parents, and, simply, Friends. The Governors also were present with their blessing.

As for the shows—no-one can have visited everything. There were ponies on the field, a big spinner near the steps, clock golf by the Pavilion, boxing in the Gymnasium, shooting in the Range. The Dining Hall was dangerous ground, full of games of

"skill" with earnest attendants, while Room 7 was occupied by a comic art gallery. Raffles and guessing competitions swarmed everywhere, a danger to purse and pride respectively. The Band of H.M. 2nd Battalion The Cheshire Regt. played in the tea marquee, and most people, I fancy, found their way there sooner or later. Boys of the School gave a display of Morris dancing and E. A. W. Morris arranged a much appreciated concert, which was held in the marquee in the evening. It is said that there was an unrehearsed display of auctioneering, but I cannot speak of that.

The evening was fine, and dancing on the cricket pitch made a fitting end to a very happy function. The music was very admirably supplied by the Irresistible Orchestra—gratis!

No definite mention has been made so far of the stalls which were the solid foundation on which the rest of the fabric was built. - E. G. Marsh (1922-1926), on the Post Office Staff, Gwelo, Southern Rhodesia, writes: "I often think that if it wasn't for the natives I should forget that I was abroad. About the only difference there is in appearance is that all the houses are of the bungalow type, and have corrugated iron roofs. The climate, of course, is rather different from that at home. Perhaps the most outstanding feature is the absence of rain for about seven or eight months during the winter season, which is very mild. Although we are well up within the tropics, owing to the great height at which the country is situated, neither the climate nor the vegetation can be described as at all tropical. We have now (September) just about reached the end of our winter, and things are beginning to get really warm again!

"Of course I have so far only experienced 'town' life out here; I suppose 'country' life is a treat in store for me. We get transferred about a good deal, and quite a number of our offices are 'one-man' affairs. One fellow who came out with me and who has since been in Gwelo with me, has recently been sent to Makwiro, where, except for a couple of natives, he is all alone. Even in town things are a bit slow for a fellow who likes a gay life, but personally I find my time more than full, and the weeks slip by before I realise it.

"I have been playing soccer during the past season for Gwelo 2nd XI. It has not been exactly a successful season from the match point of view, but in spite of some warm weather it has been most enjoyable. The cricket season is commencing shortly, so am hoping for some cricket, although I don't know

how they stand for players. Of course all the wickets out here are matting. We also get a good deal of tennis, which can be played all the year round, and is often the only sport available in small places where there are not enough people to raise a team for other games.

"I have had no more news of Stoneman (W. G. E. Stoneman, 1924-1926), but I believe he is still in Bulawayo and quite happy".

(Later news): "Our cricket season is now (October) in full swing, and I am Secretary of the local Club. So far we have had quite a successful season".
