# Pagham Revisited.

During the month of August about ten past and present members of the School decided to go for a camping holiday

to Pagham, near Bognor Regis.

Pagham was reached in various ways, and, having found the site for the tents, the camp was soon in full running order. We decided, wisely and well, to sleep about eight in the bell tent, instead of scattering ourselves amongst four tents.

We decided from the beginning to have our meals of a type necessitating a small amount of cooking. All the jobs and work of the camp were done in a sort of voluntary way, there

divers ways in quick, 1, 2, 3 time.

Owing to the revised condition of table-manners, there were two regrettable scenes. The first was the awe-inspiring spectacle, if not feeling, of a dozen fellows battling with cherry stones. It took days before we could get rid of the stones from our hair, pockets, ears or soap. The second incident concerned a potato—but on this we draw a veil.

One of our visitors, an Old Farnhamian, complete with a two-seater car, kindly took about eleven of us into Bognor and back in one afternoon—nearly a record. Imagine a car with a "dozen up" tearing through the crowded town, and speeding

home in the dark at about 11 p.m.

The rent for our site was collected in really dramatic circumstances. Late one night, a fast van of American make came tearing up, and shot out numerous relatives of the landowner. The ringleader of the same approached our inquiry bureau, and demanded from him the rent. The van then reloaded and shot off like a bolt from—a magazine.

A notice-board bearing the inscription, "Parva Domus. Magna Quies," was found knocking about on the foreshore one evening. It was carried in state to the camp, and there hung.

# The New Playing Field.

But this does not allow for soiling over, and purchasing and sowing grass seed. It is too early to mention a definite maximum, but I hope that it can be left to the O.F.A. to finish the task they undertook.

I do not think it desirable that we should have another Fête next year, but I sincerely hope that the Old Boys will be able to think of ways and means for raising money. In the meantime, will Old Boys please remember that the subscription list is still open? ### O.F.A. CRICKET CLUB.

Despite the cancellation of several games owing to bad weather, the Club can claim to have had a moderately successful season.

Seventeen matches were played in all, which included several evening games, and of the whole six were won and 11 lost. with an average of 6.35 runs per wicket, against our opponents' 7.15.

Low scoring ruled owing to the continuous wet weather providing many sticky wickets. This was also responsible for the lack of net practice. However, the evening games provided some much needed practice and encouragement, for which we are indebted to L. E. Lord, whose initiative and "spade-work" in arranging these games were much appreciated.

E. C. Patrick and J. Wing can claim a useful average in batting, the former with an average of 14 for 10 innings played. and the latter with 10.2 for 17 innings. The brunt of the bowling was borne by H. Wilkinson (who took 40 wickets), L. E. Lord (34 wickets), and J. Wing (30 wickets), but the fielding generally was again poor.

Already, during his few months of work, the income from the scheme has shown a marked and encouraging rise, and in view of the disheartening period of depression in the business world which has co-incided with his term of work, the results are especially remarkable.

The accounts do not close until the end of November, so that exact figures are not yet available, but it appears that cash receipts for the year will exceed £50, while further business assures a substantial income to follow above these

figures.

In a word, the scheme continues to prove itself a quiet and permanent success, justifying the faith which the Association has placed in it. That faith can still be strengthened by good works (e.g., good lives and motor cars, etc.!).

# The Lamp of Service.

"There is a saying, 'Youth must be served.' We say, 'Youth must serve.' "—H.R.H. the Prince of Wales to Toc H.

"Toc H" is, as most people know, signallers' jargon for the initials of "Talbot House." During the War, Talbot House was a Club, both at Poperinghe and at Ypres, for every man in the fighting forces, from General to Private. The guiding principle of the Club was the fact that all its members, irrespective of rank, were engaged together in the common service of their country.

During the winter of 1919-1920, Talbot House was re-born as an Empire-wide organisation linking together men of all ranks and classes who are inspired by the need for friendship, sacrifice and service. To that end, it guides itself by what are known as the "Four Points of the Compass": Fellowship, Service, Fair Thinking and the Kingdom of God, and, so that the fourth point may not be forgotten, there is a lamp, relit whenever a branch of the Club meets, with its encircling inscription, "In lumine tuo videbimus lumen" (In Thy light shall we see the light).

What has this to do with Schools, it may be asked? The answer is that there is a Schools' Section of the Toc H, whose objects are:—

- (i.) To acquaint those who leave Schools with the many opportunities for the adventure of service;
- (ii.) To introduce to Toc H itself all those who also agree with the other three "Points of the Compass," and wish to try to follow them out;
- (iii.) To use the world-wide growth of Toc H for helping those who are going abroad either direct from School or in a few years.

Thus, a boy on the point of leaving School can be put in touch with ways of service, even though he does not take any further steps and join Toc H.

On general grounds, it must be obvious to any boy who has had the advantages of a Public School or a Secondary School training that there is much work within his scope, especially in view of the fact that nine-tenths of the boys of the land leave School at 14. Think of Scouting, Boys' Brigades, Boys' Clubs, visiting hospitals, helping to run libraries, and helping the blind or the deaf.

How does all this affect F.G.S.?

There is a branch of Toc H in Farnham. During the last two years, here are some of the things they have done by way of service:—Carol singing for the blind, putting up wireless sets for the blind, visiting and entertaining the sick, helping in Boys' Club work, and gardening for old people who cannot afford a gardener.

Here, then, is a magnificent organisation ready to enlist the services of any likely boy, who upon leaving School wants to do something for others. It does not matter whether he will be staying in the locality or living, say, in London, or going abroad. He can be "put into touch" through his Headmaster.

If there are any Old Boys who would like to do something, will they please let me know? And will Present Boys note the contents of this article "for future reference"?
