Editorial Notes.

The wars are over but the economic consequences of global warfare remain. For us that means that *The Farnhamian* remains more slender than of old, and that it is largely a record of facts without the spice of imagination and literary invention. Let us hope that the time is not far off when we shall not be so restricted; and, when that time comes, let us hope that we shall have essays and poems and drawings pressed upon us by the boys of the School.

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Since our last issue there has been an unusual number of changes on the Staff. Miss George (Paris Diploma) left at the end of the Summer Term and Mr. L. A. F. C. Winter-Knight, B.Sc., Mus. Bac., at the end of September. To both of them we offer our good wishes for happiness and success in their new spheres of activity. There are two new members of the Staff—Mr. C. D. Mulhearn, B.A. (French), and Mr. L. E. M. Evans, M.A. (Science and Mathematics). On behalf of the whole School we extend to them a cordial welcome.

To the great majority of the "Present" Mr. A. J. Wills, A.R.C.A., will appear as a new master. But this is not so. After being with us only a year, Mr. Wills was called up in 1940 and served in the R.A.C. The Army has now released him, and to our great pleasure he has returned to the teaching of Art among us. While acknowledging our debt to the School of Art for stepping into the breach in his absence, we may be permitted to rejoice that once more this important element in the curriculum will be fostered under our own roof by one of our own masters.

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Everyone will wish us to express here our sympathy with Mr. Tomlinson in his unfortunate illness and hope for his speedy recovery. During his absence Chemistry will be in the care of Dr. Richard (sometime Professor of Biology in the University of Munich) whom we welcome most warmly.

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We have to announce with regret the death of yet another emeritus member of the Staff—Dr. George Brown died on the 31st of October. Only a few days before he was seen walking about as usual, but age took its toll. He would have been ninety-one

in December. From January, 1893, to December, 1919, the School was honoured by having such a distinguished chemist among its Masters, and even such a lengthy retirement as his was not sufficient to dim the memory of him. Indeed it has been preserved and will be perpetuated by the "Dr. George Brown" Prize. To his family we offer our heartfelt sympathy in their loss, which is also ours.

It is hoped that, at a later date, we may be able to publish an appreciation more worthy of the subject than the present hasty and inadequate note.

Debating Society.

The Debating Society has had a very successful term. Officers were elected at the first meeting as follows: Vice-Chairman, P. T. Sheehan; Secretary, D. E. Lampard; Committee, E. A. Glaysher, G. C. Bowmer, J. A. Brake, P. J. Holmes.

Five debates have already been held: attendance has been good, especially at the fourth. First, Mr. Bowmer proposed, and Mr. Glaysher opposed the motion that "All proceedings of the House of Commons should be broadcast." The motion was defeated by eight votes to two. At the next debate Mr. Rose proposed, and Mr. Cohn opposed the motion that "The Theatre is a more beneficial form of entertainment than the Cinema." The motion was defeated by ten votes to two. Then Mr. Holmes proposed, and Mr. Sheehan opposed the motion that "Town life is better than country life." The motion was defeated by twelve votes to four. Next Mr. Pooley proposed, before a crowded house, the motion that "Speed is one of man's greatest benefits." After a lively debate the motion was defeated by sixteen votes to nine. Last, Mr. Dalrymple proposed, and Mr. Glaysher opposed the motion that "The examination system is a failure." The motion was carried by ten votes to six. Two points call for comment. The first is that, at present, speaking is confined to a few members of the VI Form. It would be pleasant to hear a little more from younger members. The second is that few speakers seem willing to keep to the subject of the debate. The value of the Society will be increased by attention to this failing.

Model Flying Club.

We have ten enthusiastic members and at least twelve good machines, two of the latter being built in Club time. Owing to the shortage of strip rubber for the motors, the types favoured are gliders; but there are one or two rubber-driven models. Bigger and better gliders are being built, including one having a seven foot wing span.

Recently the Club held a competition at Frensham with 4 to 1 pulley launchings and J. Mitchell, flying a three foot wing span glider, was the winner. The losers did not lose "face," however, but one or two nearly lost noses through near misses from diving aircraft!

The long winter evenings reduce outdoor activities but provide splendid constructional opportunities indoors.

Tethered flying, a most amusing indoor sport, is now planned for the winter.

Next season we hope to enter competitions with other clubs.

The Village Green.

Over the horizon the first glow of dawn brightens, and a shaft of sunlight flashes down the valley, silhouetting a little church tower. Now a lark has burst into song, and while we listen, the sun rises and reveals before our eyes a village. It is not an out-standing village: there are just the usual thatched cottages, a grey stone church, a few larger houses almost lost in the depths of the forest which covers most of the hill slopes, and a small white-washed inn. And in the centre, a little patch of verdure—the village green.

The song of the lark is now accompanied—or rather rivalled—by a shrill whistling emanating from the far side of the green. A man, the author of this sign of life, appears through a gap in the hedge; vaults the white railings; and starts to walk across the grass. He waves and shouts a cheery "Mornin'," to someone behind us, and on turning we see a man in a green apron taking down the shutters of a little shop. Other people are astir, too, and soon they start to emerge from their homes. There is a drum of hooves coming from the direction of the farm on the

hillside, and down the slope rides a prosperous-looking man, with his reins in one hand and a case in the other. He, too, takes a short cut across the green, and disappears through a gate on the far side.

Two dogs have started a discordant disapproval of something, and now our ears are also offended by a metallic clattering. There is the cause of the trouble—the milkman, carrying four cans of milk, who has just come out of the vicarage gate. More clattering starts, and a trap rumbles down the road, with the polished brass rims of two milk churns glinting over the top of a pile of cardboard boxes. Now there is a more mechanical sound, and we see a tractor leave the farmyard and make for the fields on the hillside.

It is warmer now, and the scintillating drops of dew on the green are drying up. Life has started again and, as if to wake up any slothful members of this industrious community, two piercing sounds come down the valley. First a local warning—from a bull concealed in the farm buildings—and then a reminder of the outside world—the whistle of a train standing in the station two miles away. But these are unnecessary, for the windows of every house are wide open, displaying the activities of the occupants to all those who care to watch. We, however, are the only idle people in the village, and no-one else has time to observe the doings of the other households. Even the children are busily preparing for the day's work. Soon they, too, will be off to their appointed tasks.

Yes, there they are now! Three little boys have come through the gap in the railings leading from the church to the green. They are playing a continuous game of leapfrog, making the most of their last free minutes before starting school. Suddenly the continuity breaks, and the youngsters scamper off towards the little school. The cause of their terror appears, in the form of a prim middle-aged woman carrying several books. In contrast to her upright figure, an old man, wearing a clerical collar, is shambling in the opposite direction across the green. He meets the schoolmistress half-way across and, after exchanging with her a few comments on the weather, passes on in the general direction of the church.

A tinny bell has now started ringing in the diminutive school bell-cote. Some late-comers are sprinting down the road, in the vain hope of arriving on time. They pass through the school gate just as the bell stops ringing, and a few moments later the voices of two dozen little folk are raised in unison, singing the morning hymn. Another bell is ringing now. This time it is that of an ancient bicycle, which is slowly transporting a corpulent old woman towards the shop. She is welcomed at the door by the keeper of that indispensable institution, who is compelled to leave the doorway to allow her passage.

Everyone has started his daily work, and the green is deserted.

The school bell rings for the last time of the day. Childish shrieks accompany the pouring forth of the school's full complement of childlike shapes. This time, however, they are moving slower than before along the road. They climb lazily over the railings and trudge across the green. In the farmyard a horse whinnies as it is released from its harness with a rattle of chains, and the sound of a tractor splutters and dies. Now men, returning from their day's work, are following the example of the children on their way home: trampling the green grass with muddy boots. No whistling now; no singing to liven their weary steps. From each cottage we hear sighs of relief which accompany the opening of the gate, and feet scraping up the garden path.

The working day is over, but the day is not yet ended.

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There is one bright spot in the darkened village. The windows of the "Coach and Horses" cast a pool of light on the road outside, and through them we can see the men of the district relaxing after a hard day's work, and using their remaining energy in creating an atmosphere of lighthearted revelry. But this cannot, and does not, last long, and at length the men emerge in small groups and make for their respective homes across the green. One by one the lights go out, until all signs of life have disappeared. The moon is rising now, casting deep shadows everywhere. Once again the church tower is silhouetted; the leaves of the nearby trees rustle in the breeze; and the pale moonlight illuminates the green—the centre of village life—which looks unaltered by yet another busy day.

Cricket.

The cricket season of 1945 was, on the whole, very disappointing. A strong team on paper, the First Eleven never lived up to expectations and too much was left to two boys. If these failed, the team as a whole failed. Larby, our opening batsman for five seasons, and one of the best we have ever had, captained the side, with Chitty as Vice-Captain.

Unfortunately for us Chitty, who the previous season had bowled so well, failed with the ball, so that we had to rely largely on Trollop, fast, and Clark, medium-paced. We were in dire need of a spin bowler. The fielding of half the team was good but of the other half it was ragged, lazy, and irresolute. Baker's fielding was a joy to watch and should have been an inspiration to the lazy ones. Larby, Trollop and Karn were prepared to play forcing strokes but the majority of the remainder were content

to wait for the ball, a fatal practice on most school wickets. There was no lack of keenness here and several noticeably improved as the season progressed, especially Piper, Karn, Ventham and Donald. But generally we had to rely on Larby and Trollop who could not be expected to make big scores in every match.

If the First Eleven disappointed, the Second Eleven surpassed expectations. We had here a team largely composed of newcomers whose enthusiasm and tenacity were very praiseworthy. Captained by Sheehan, they went on from success to success and enjoyed their best season for some time. Runs came all down, and in Tingley we had an excellent bowler. Let us hope they continue their good work in the First Eleven next year.

Two Junior matches were played and won. Among the Juniors we have some very promising material.

Finally, all boys in all teams should remember that their object, when they are batting, is to get as many runs as possible, and when they are fielding to keep down the runs to a minimum. If this is borne in mind fielding can be as thrilling as batting or bowling—and remember—two hands are better than one.
