The Scout Troop.

At a battalion camp, held in the grounds of Cranleigh School last August, our party consisted of twenty Cadets under the command of the Headmaster. Lack of space limits me to the observation that the week was very successful and enjoyable.

An Autumn Walk.

I remember one such walk which I enjoyed last autumn, when I spent a whole day in the countryside, enjoying the rustic beauties of hedgerow, thicket, heath and stream. I took my lunch and tea with me, and, leaving home after an early breakfast, stepped out through the fresh, dew-laden morning air. I passed first through a wood of pines, which reared their tall, dark, skeleton forms into the morning sky. Every now and again the thud of a falling cone, or the sharp crack of a dead branch, could be heard on the still silent air. Deep in the wood the mist was still heavy, and its chill blanket swirled in clammy folds about me. I hurried on over the soft carpet of pine needles till I reached the edge of the wood, and came out into the village, which was just beginning to bestir itself.

As I walked along the village street I could see swallows peering from under the eaves, while in the gardens below a few late hollyhocks still bloomed, and Virginia creeper, though rather past its former glory, arched colourfully over the doorways of



some dwellings. I passed on by the quaint little church, and the picturesque old Tabard Inn, with its weatherbeaten sign, ancient stables and coaching house, and on to the broad heath beyond, where furze, fern and bracken, mingled with smouldering heather. Thin white paths, where the chalk bed had been exposed, swept to the summit of the surrounding hills.

I bent my steps toward the small wood on the top of a distant eminence. As I traversed the heath, I could

hear the crickets chirping gaily on all sides, and ever and anon a startled hare would bound madly away, or a pheasant would rise at my very feet with a curious whirring sound and take to wing. Half-way up the slope grew a great rambling blackberry bramble, heavily laden with its luscious shiny black fruit, which I sampled before proceeding on my way. I crossed a trickle of water, which rippled musically over its stony bed to disappear in a maze of stunted bushes and thick undergrowth, and climbed up the steep miniature gorge of an erstwhile stream.

The covert of trees, which I had seen, turned out to be mostly of the graceful, smooth barked beech, whose glossy foliage was now tinted with autumnal shades. There were also sturdy oaks, lofty elms, lissom silver birches, and beautiful, richly laden chestnuts, as well as many others. The faint woodland path which I was following often disappeared altogether in the grass, to appear like a red rut amid the distant boles. The ground was strewn with prickly chestnut burrs, acorns and twigs, and fallen

leaves had drifted under the bushes in a glorious profusion of reds, greens, yellows and browns. Everywhere there were thick clusters of ferns, whose soft green was reddening, and the bushes were all clothed in their "Fall" coats.

I could hear the curious whistle of the linnet and the cheerful chirrup of the chaffinch above me and, in the distance, the perpetual tap-tap of the brightly hued woodpecker. On a nearby tree I saw the golden-headed yellow-hammer, and caught a glimpse of the red and white head of the goldfinch in the foliage above me, while a



cloud of rooks hovered over the trees to the left. I emerged from the wood under a noble oak, on a mossy bank by a stream. The crystal waters fell over a series of rills, and scintillated in the midday sun. During the course of many seasons it had eroded the earth from the base of the tree, leaving a tangle of roots in which was caught a mass of dead leaves, round which the waters fiercely eddied.

I decided to have my lunch here; and it was a choice spot, for there was a magnificent panorama unfolded before my eyes. In the distance, a line of rolling blue hills broke the skyline to the left, while a great tract of parkland, divided by the silver ribbon of a river, and studded with clumps of trees and redroofed farmsteads, stretched to the right. Below me lay the river, twisting and turning sinuously into the distance, to empty itself into a small lake. The long sweep of the hill on which I lay

blazed with heather, its flames licking to the very brink of the placid stream below. On the other side of the river, however, there were lush pastures, with only a few willows drooping over the bank, in whose shade were several cows, half immersed in the cooling water, lazily flicking their tails to rid themselves of the innumerable pestering flies.

I followed the little stream in its cascades to the river and stood for some time on the rustic bridge, which spanned it,



looking down into the still waters, where carp, trout and shoals of "tiddlers" flitted gaily about. A dragonfly, with its gossamer wings and body of metallic hue, whirled by in careless abandon, while a trout leapt from the water to snap up one of the ever-hovering flies and disappear with almost the same movement, leaving an widening circle of ever ripples on the surface.

I passed on downstream

to the lakelet, with its bordering willow thickets, sedges and rushes, in whose fastnesses the beautifully marked mallard drake and his rather drab mate, the teal and snipe, moorhen and diver, nested securely. On the shimmering surface the stately swan glided his serene, regal way, leaving hardly a ripple in his wake. Near a clump of alders a perky little moorhen was bobbing up and down, preening her feathers. As I threw myself down on the greensward, brer fox, with his beady eyes and bushy tail, shot from under a nearby fallen tree trunk into a nearby thicket. A brilliant blue-green kingfisher haunted the shady banks on the other shore, occasionally diving into the water, to come up triumphant with a small fish in his bill.

I rested here for a while, and then proceeded on my way. I soon struck a footpath, which led me, over a stile, into a country lane. As I walked along I noticed a hedgehog curled up asleep under a thick hawthorn hedge, along which a tiny wren was aimlessly fluttering, while in the dry ditch there was a profusion of nettles and thistles. At the edge of the path there were clover, plantain and tassel in abundance, and in a neighbouring field a large patch of colt's-foot. Further on I came to a mellow brick farmhouse, opposite which was a golden grainfield, then being reaped. In the distance I could hear the purring of the tractor, and the merry shouts of the children as they helped to "stook" the sheaves. As I was passing, a small rabbit scuttled out of the corn across my path and started a covey

of partridge in the next field. Nearby there was an orchard, from which the warble of the blackbird was wafted on the late afternoon breeze.

I ate my tea here, and was glad to accept the offer of a glass of milk from the farmer's wife. After tea I hurried on, for I still had some way to go. As the dusk fell, all the trees and shrubs seemed to assume mystic shapes: shy old Brock the Badger ambled lazily into the brush, and the night air was laden with the sweet smells and strange rustlings of Nature. Above me swept the brown owl, on his nightly prowl, hooting dismally, while myriads of gnats hovered jerkily overhead.

I reached home, and, turning at the gate, looked out on that same pinewood through which I had passed that morning and which seemed even more mysterious now than it had then. I pondered on all the natural beauties which I had been privileged to see that day—the open heath, the rustling wood, the meandering river, the placid lake and the quiet country lanes—and I reflected how wonderful they were. Then, turning again, I went in—to bed.

Cricket, 1943.

The past season was one of the most successful we have had for some years. The First Eleven lost only one game and the Second two, one of which was lost by a single when we had to field a very weak team owing to outside calls upon our players.

Hopkins led the side well and took upon his shoulders a captain's full responsibilities, with the result that everything went smoothly. His bowling was excellent and his batting was much more successful. Larby, apart from one superb innings, had no luck whatsoever. Kirk would have done much better with more discrimination, but even so he played some good innings. Spectacular hitting is very exhilarating while it lasts,

but too often it is of brief duration. Milburn shaped well and played one outstanding innings. His bowling lacked variety and spin. Chitty, in the side for his batting, developed into one of our best bowlers, with swingers that had many batsmen guessing. Nash stubbornly defended and, with more experience and practice, especially with off-balls, will do very well. bowling was, too often, an open invitation to the batsman to hit. Reeve, Brehaut, Sturt and West all did quite well, and Sheehan was a perky wicket-keeper. The fielding of some, particularly of Nash and Larby, was brilliant, and all were keen. fielding is an indirect way of winning many matches.

The Second Eleven, composed chiefly of young boys, had a very good season. The batting was somewhat agricultural but promising; the bowling was good. The most pleasing feature was the keenness of all players. With practice, and determination to carry out instructions as far as possible, many of these boys should become good cricketers and worthy members of our

First Eleven.

No Junior matches were played, but at two net practices nobody was missing, and all were so keen that it was difficult to drag them away after two hours' strenuous practice.
