The Cadet Corps is to be inspected on July 23rd, and points for the Inter-Platoon Competition awarded, by Major Haig-Brown. The "authorities" are very pleased that in spite of the withdrawal of the Government grant, we—unlike many other schools—are not disbanding, but are carrying on, and maintaining our numbers.

Thursday, July 19th, was a field-day. Capt. Stroud marched the Recruits to Tilford Green, where, at a given "zero" hour, the four Platoons made an attack on the bridges—two on one bridge and two on the other—simultaneously.

The points counting for the proud position of "Cock House," 1922-23, will not be complete in time to enable us in this Number to congratulate the winning House. There remain three House matches to play, as we go to press, which, though they affect the second and third places, cannot challenge Harding's lead in sports. But, above all, there are still the points for Work to go into the reckoning, and we cannot yet say which House will be top dog on the total.

Sports Day was again a marked success as such. Dame Margaret Lloyd George, who was in the neighbourhood on that day, presented the prizes. Our experience this year, however, when even the Official Weather Reports went so far as to use the adjective "hot," practically crystallised into a decision the Headmaster's project of holding Sports Day in future in the Easter Term. This would not only give us weather more suitable for athletic exercises, but also would bring us into line with most of the bigger schools. Moreover, it would leave the end of the Summer Term free for some more social gathering, at which there would be opportunity for parents to meet and talk with the School Staff—an opportunity not furnished by Sports Day, when the Masters are too fully occupied.

In his effort to provide good weather for this day, the "Clerk" rather overdid it. The day could not have been finer, but it could have been very much cooler. Considering the great heat in which training and the actual competitions were carried out, the performances this year were very creditable. These included five records broken by the younger boys: the 220 yards and the quarter-mile "under eleven," and the 220 yards, the quarter-mile, and the high jump "under fourteen."

As on previous Sports Days, the Inter-School Relay—again won by Guildford—proved a hard struggle. Our team

The Cricket.

Our Cricket this year has shown a marked improvement on the past two or three seasons. Without any outstanding player, and without any "tail," we have had a good all-round XI. One of the best features of this season's play has been the very good fielding; very few runs have been given away, and dropped catches have been rare. The batting of the XI. has been quite sound, and free from "slogging"; there has been a real and successful effort to play the various strokes correctly. Shipley in particular has been noticeable for this, and his cricket has improved immensely. He, by the way, has filled the gap behind the wickets, caused by the departure of Larn, and has done so very creditably. In the matter of bowling we have been in the happy position of having an XI. all of whom could bowl, the most successful being Tribe, Stemp, Cull and Bengé. In our matches we have done well, losing only to Woking (our own fault!) and to Guildford. Guildford's victory was a real disappointment to us, as we were hopeful of beating them this year: we live in hopes of doing so next year!

The School 1st XI. consisted of: Elmslie (capt.), Webb (vice-capt.), Cull, Young, Bengé, Tribe, Shipley, Stemp, Purcell, Green, Rushton; with Russell and Munfield as reserves.

In the House matches, Massingberd have carried all before them, and they have the record of scoring over 100 runs in each of three successive matches. To School House, however, belongs the best score; for, in defeating Harding, they made 186 runs.

I am sure the improvement shown in the School Cricket this year is due to the "House" matches and to the afternoon "Form" games.

S.S.S. Junior Cup Final.

FARNHAM GRAMMAR SCHOOL v. PURLEY
COUNTY SCHOOL.

The contest for the above cup, which F.G.S. won by 4 goals to 3, took place on March 28th last, too late to be reported in last term's Magazine. The following report of the game is therefore reprinted from "The Herald" of April 7th:—

"These two Schools met at Malden on Wednesday in last week (as briefly reported in our last issue), to contest the final of the above cup. The game resulted in a victory for Farnham by 4 goals to 3. The opening portion of the game was very evenly contested, but after a while, in spite of sun and wind, the exchanges began to be in favour of Farnham, who made some good attacks on Purley's goal. During one of these Tribe sent Purcell away nicely, and his centre found Weedon ready, the latter scoring a good goal. Following this, Farnham played with determination, and were unfortunate in not scoring again, through Tribe. Purley had to rely more on defence than attack, but were dangerous on more than one occasion, and about fifteen minutes from half-time they drew level. This goal worked a complete transformation; from now to the interval Farnham's defence was considerably rattled, and Purley put on two more goals, and thus led at the interval by 3-1. However, the resumption of play soon showed that Farnham did not consider themselves a beaten team; they now played a very forceful game, and in less than 15 minutes had wiped off the arrears, and made matters even. Tribe was responsible for both goals. The game now became a very strenuous one, each side striving for the winning goal. Farnham again took the lead, through a good bit of individual work by Tribe, who, although hampered by three or four defenders, fought his way through and scored. From now to the end the game continued to be keenly contested, but nothing further was scored, and the struggle ended as stated.

"Farnham have now set up a record in the Surrey Secondary School Competitions by winning both the Senior and Junior Cups in the same season.

"Farnham deserved their success, for, excepting for the quarter of an hour mentioned, they were superior to their opponents. Tribe was a continual menace, giving his opponents no rest the whole game through. Cook, at half, was another worrier, who did excellent work, as did also Renge at back. Farnham team: Mackay a; Miller and Bengé; Godwin, Hurdwell b and Cooke; Slater, Weedon, Tribe, Hardy b, and Purcell."

When at work she impresses you as a very business-like little lady. Her eyes are bright and alert, and she looks efficient. She moves about briskly, placing her feet crisply, precisely.

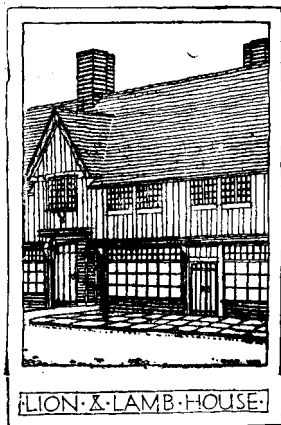
