## Cricket Notes.

The season just over, though not as successful as the last, has, nevertheless, been a successful one. The team as a whole has been fairly sound, and has turned out much better than we anticipated. Although we have suffered more defeats than last year, not one of them has been by a really decisive margin, and we feel that, with a little luck, one or two of them might have been turned into victories. The chief feature of the games has been the really splendid fielding of our boys, of whom, perhaps, H. W. Hern and A. G. Mackay deserve special mention. The fact that 61 catches have been made (most of these in the slips) is evidence of that.

Our batting has been quite sound, working out at an average of 8.99 runs per wicket, against 7.08 runs per wicket by our opponents. F. W. Grinstead on one occasion exceeded his century without losing his wicket.

When we come to the bowling things are not so satisfactory; it is here that our weakness lies. L. B. Benge did not reproduce his form of last season, and R. F. Baker and A. G. Mackay had their off periods. The trouble here was that we had so few "change" bowlers, and those we did possess were not used to the best advantage. J. C. Kingcome proved the most useful of these, and, seeing he is so young, should be an asset to the eleven in future seasons.

These notes would not be complete without expressing our gratitude to the Governors for providng us with a motor mower, which has played no small part in making the games enjoyable and attractive.

House Cricket has reached a higher standard this season than can be remembered, which augurs well for the future. H.C.K.

## Bus Driving During the General Strike.

Even on the second day of the Strike there were 140 L.G.O.C. buses running through the traffic-crammed streets, whilst the number of volunteers had grown to 2,960 .

On Thursday, 8th May, some "Old 'Farnhamians'", volunteered, one as a driver and the other as a conductor. As I knew both these boys, I joined them on the "volunteer" list, with the intention of going up to Town on Saturday morning.

On the Friday evening, however, I heard of some more Old Boys who were going up on the following morning. Seven of us managed to squeeze into a five-seater car, and, having arrived at the Chiswick depôt, the first thing we saw was a bunch of pickets with red ribbons in their button-holes, as well as soldiers with tin helmets and fixed bayonets. Then we saw the first really amusing thing. It was a young fellow, distinguished by a very smart pair of 'plus-fours,' a big red and white scarf, and hair very neatly brushed back. He was conducting a bus.

When we got into the works the whole roadway was patrolled by soldiers. We had to line up in a queue at a little inquiry office, where they asked our names and occupations in ordinary life. I heard afterwards that one of the "Old 'Farnhamians," " on being questioned as to his age, said he was 18 years old. They told him he was too young, and that they could not accept him. After resting against a neighbouring fence for "four years" (=four minutes), he joined up in the queue again, and this time said he was 22 years of age. The authorities were satisfied, and he was taken on.

Then we were taken to a building, where we each had to fill up a large form, and pass a medical examination and a sight test; and finally we were conducted to a form-room, very similar to those at school, where we were instructed in the art of bus-conducting. The drivers were tested round a large square, whilst a Scotland Yard detective watched on one side and a regular bus mechanic on the other.

This instruction being over, ration books were given us, in the front of which was a space for one's identification. One of our party who is short, thick and fat, had put down in his book, "fairly tall and slim." I expect he intended this description of his figure to be true after a week's hard work. After we had been shown the large paint shop where we were to sleep, we started our first day's work.

While we were walking down to the Allocation Office we came across the two "Old 'Farnhamians'" who had come up on Thursday. The driver's coat was torn from top to bottom, and he had a large iron bar in his hand; the other, being the conductor, was not quite so badly torn about, but was in possession of a similar weapon. As we were going through the Allocation Office, I became separated from my friends, and, being told to get into a lorry which was waiting outside and was filled partly with police and partly with volunteers, I was informed we were
going to Harrow to commandeer six buses from a garage locked up by strikers. We had not been on the road ten minutes when three T.U.C. men commenced to follow us on motor bikes. When we arrived at the garage we had to break a door open to get the buses out. After we had brought the buses out, four volunteers went on each one, and the police followed in a van in the rear. By this time a crowd of several hundred people had formed. One of the Reds in the crowd shouted to a fellow on the top of a bus that he was afraid to come down and fight. He stopped the bus and came down, but before the bout was advanced very far the police stepped in. No further excitement occurred on the way back, except that many drivers hit lamp-posts and rode over kerbs at corners. I spent the rest of the day in the canteen listening to a voluntary jazz band.

The next morning we arose at half-past four, but did not get out with a bus until half-past seven. While we were waiting for our bus we saw some very humorous things written on boards across broken windows, such as : "Emergency Exit," "Only to be used in Case of Fire," and on another windowless vehicle : "Ride in this Bus and enjoy the Fresh Air." The bus on which some of our "Old 'Farnhamians'" had been driving had written upon it the School motto : "Nisi Dominus Frustra." Another legend was : "To stop Bus, wring Driver's neck once; penalty for improper use, $£ 5 . "$

Although it is hard work standing in a bus all day, it is certainly amusing. Again and again one would ask for the same fare twice. Then people would ask if the bus went to a certain place, and you answered "Yes," afterwards looking on your route cards to make sure. One person who got on my bus, which I told her went to Victoria, after taking a half-an-hour's ride, got out and commenced to storm at my partner and myself, saying that we had brought her out of her way and that she would lose the only train that was running that day. She argued with us for several minutes until I got on the bus and pulled the bell, with the result that my fellow conductor had to do a sprint to catch up.

Once while we were going down a crowded street we stopped suddenly, and in an instant I lay sprawled on the floor of the bus, with my pockets full of money. I had to be assisted to my feet again by one of the passengers. One funny thing happened when we were passing the Albert Hall. I was inside collecting the fares and had no idea as to where we were, when the other conductor on the bus told me that we had arrived at Kensington Gas Works. I therefore called out, "Anyone getting off at Kensington Gas Works," much to the amusement of the passengers.

It was not an uncommon sight when driving round London to see lamp-posts that had been bent and even broken, by buses, whose drivers had not made allowance for their length. Very often drivers who did not know their way about Town, lost their
way. Two Farnham fellows who did know their way about Town, but did not know their route, would take people just where they wanted to go. Many other London fellows would drive home at mid-day, and leave their buses outside their front doors whilst they had lunch. If you were not quick enough in getting your tickets arranged before you left the Depôt, people would get on and off the bus before you had time to collect their fares. Many of the old buses we used broke down, and when this happened we merely had to sit and wait for a van to be sent out from the Depôt, as we were not supplied with a single spanner.

During my stay there I only saw three of the many volunteers that were injured. Two had broken arms, and another was put on a stretcher and taken to hospital.

When the Strike was called off on Friday, we were thanked by Lord Ashfield for our services rendered to the country.

## Inter-House Athletic Sports.

These Sports were held on Thursday and Friday, the 25th and 26th of March, during the Spring Term, but they were too late for inclusion in the last issue. We have introduced a new system this year-that each House should enter a team for the following events :-
(i.) Distance Relay, (ii.) Sprint Relay, (iii.) Long and High Jumps, (iv.) Throwing the Cricket Ball.

The usual Sports were held this Term, but on an individual basis only. An account and the results will be found in this issue.

We append a report of the Inter-House Sports, which is taken from the Farnham Herald for April 3rd, 1926.

Points for the Inter-House Cup were awarded as follows :For the races, 12 for first place, 9 for second, 6 for third, and 3 for fourth; for the jumps, 8 for first, 6 for second, 4 for third, and 2 for fourth; for throwing the cricket ball, 4 for first, 3 for second, two for third, and 1 for fourth. Teams of four were entered for the sprint relay races, and of three for the other events. The senior and junior championships are reckoned as separate competitions, the age limit for juniors being 14 years 6 months and under on 31st July, 1926. Harding House won the senior championship with 41 points, Morley and School tying for second place with 22 each, Childe being fourth with 17 , and Massingberd House fifth with 8 points. The junior championship was won by Massingberd House with 41 points, Morley being second with 27, School third with 20, Childe fourth with 19, and Harding House fifth with 3 points. There were some very
keen struggles, and the average performances, particularly in the senior high jump, were good. The staff acted as officials.

## A Visit to Winchester.

Experience is a hard teacher. The Brewery waggon we had in 1925 seemed to regard us as so many human dice, and treated us accordingly. This year, therefore, in spite of the disadvantage of threatened ruin to our savings accounts, we decided to travel by char-a-banc. The day was perfect, thanks to Lord Dunboyne, and in fact we found Winchester in the throes of a heat wave.

The Cathedral was first on our visiting list. We entered by the West Door, and found ourselves in another world. The quiet calm and peace overcame our crowd's instinct to chatter. Even Jone was silent. There is something in Winchester's glory, the perpendicular Nave with its slender columns and the fan-like vaulting, that compels admiration, even from the least aesthetic of boys.

At the wicket gate in the North Aisle we were accosted by an elderly gentleman in black cassock. He levied a toll of five shillings. "For the Cathedral repairs," he said.

Soon our guide had arrived, a kindly old man with the snowy hair of a minor prophet. He beamed upon us with a calm serenity that put us immediately at our ease. He seemed to be intimating that this was a moment to which he had long looked forward, and that from now onward quiet happiness would reign supreme.

We were now in the North Transept, whose Norman arches and clerestory windows told us that this was the oldest part of the Cathedral. The change from Norman to Early English and from Early English to Perpendicular told their own story, where William of Wykeham's work succeeded that of Henry of Blois.

The Minor Prophet led the procession into the choir. There we gazed on the wonderfully carved stone reredos with its rows of statues, each containing some small symbol of a characteristic incident in the life of its subject, St. Peter's keys and St. Lawrence's gridiron. All unsuspecting, the Minor Prophet invited questions : a fatal error. He did not know IIIa! Questions were fired at him at a rate calculated to make a machine gun turn green with envy. The thought must have crossed his mind that the late King Herod had been unjustly blamed for a policy that was both statesmanlike and in the interests of the public. But IIIa. have a winning manner, and by the time we had seen the painting on the wall of the Lady Chapel, the chair used by Queen Mary at her marriage with Philip of Spain, and the Crypt containing the original Norman foundations, and a stone effigy of William of Edynton, our founder, his patriarchal benevolence had returned.

We were all looking forward to the ascent of the Tower. Here we were handed over to another guide, the Minor Prophet feeling unequal to the task of coping with 240 narrow stone steps. In the Bell-ringing Chamber IIIa. demonstrated their ability as carillonneurs. Eight stalwart youths were each given a hand-bell, exact replicas in tone of the huge bells above, and
they were placed in order of scale. By making each boy ring his bell when pointed at, our guide was able to play on these bells "Home, Sweet Home" and "Abide with me," much to the amusement of the rest of us, who were sitting on benches round the room.

On the roof of the Tower we were present at the making of history. Captain Nicola, when he discovered the "Rosetta Stone" could not have been more thrilled than we were as we assisted at the discovery of a bird, squashed flat, after being under the leads of the roof for 300 years. The bird now holds a place of honour in Winchester Museum.

After the Cathedral came lunch, a hurried al fresco meal as time was precious. It was a thirsty day. Two local shopkeepers were cleared completely out of their stores of mineral waters. A.A.W. is said by jealous people to have consumed the contents of at least five bottles in as many minutes. The poor conductor of the party was besieged in the middle of his sandwich.
'I have got five bottles of lemonade, but I haven't got a thing," said A.A.W.
"A thing? What sort of a thing?" said the conductor.
"A thing you open bottles with."
"Oh ! you mean a thing. There is a penknife in my lefthand pocket."

Winchester College came next on our list. Here we had the service of an old friend, the head-porter. We saw all the old buildings of 1394, the chapel, the cloisters with chantry chapel in the centre, and with the epitaph of the old Wykehamist : "He was drowned while bathing," it said, "and therefore went to Heaven instead of Oxford."

A brief visit was paid to the West Gate, the only survival of the defences of the City. Here we were back in the Middle Ages with Henry's III.'s standard yard measure, the portcullis grooves, and the opening overhanging the gateway, down which molten lead was poured during an attack.

After tea L.R.B. made a discovery. Grape fruit could be obtained for twopence! He was proud of his bargain, but after one taste he quickly threw the rest away when he thought noone was looking, and tried to forget the incident.

Only one thing worthy of note occurred during the "tuneful" journey home. W.E.B. has missed his vocation in life. He ought to be a professional cocoanut shier. From his seat in the moving char-a-banc he aimed an empty food packet at a barrel standing at the side of the road.
