Speech Day.

His speech, after the presentation of prizes, naturally concerned itself with this and allied topics, and was rendered the more suitable for his younger hearers by a number of stories from his own rich and wide experience. But, as the Magazine must still be kept slim, we cannot even quote; we can only thank him for his kindly interest in our affairs and for the warmly personal way in which he distributed the prizes and certificates.

Debating Society.

A meeting comprising thirteen unprepared two-minute speeches showed the standard of entertainment which can be derived from a debate. This was concluded by a vote on the best speech.

A motion that "School records should be considered instead of examination results" was defeated on the grounds that examinations work efficiently enough.

In our last debate, national and international issues were raised before it was decided "That civil aviation after the war must be Government controlled."

With a number of last season's first eleven still at School, a good season was confidently expected. A glance at the results will show how well these expectations were realised. Only one school, Salesian College, lowered our colours—they did it twice—but we reciprocated and hold a credit balance of three goals from the four encounters. The other two games we lost were against Army teams. To beat Guildford twice was a source of profound gratification to the members of last year's team. We had not beaten them since 1931.

The team played very well together, with great keenness and confidence. The attack was good, constructive and well-knit, but the backs were not always reliable: it was too often left to the ubiquitous Sturt to come back and clear. The loss of Ricketts at Christmas made the position worse.

Nash was a good captain, indefatigable as a forward and safe as a back; Sturt, as a half-back, was consistently good, a splendid and tireless footballer; Chitty, with his raking stride and ability to clear from all angles, was a heartache to centre-forwards; Larby, at left half, did not quite master the art of tackling, but revelled in attack; Brehaut, outside-left, tricky, clever, centred well; Milburn, inside-left, though he sometimes tired before time, had a successful season; Kirk, at centre-forward, shot powerfully and accurately and scored many goals; Fisher, outside-right, improved match by match; Roberts, at his best as a half-back, did useful work as a forward and as a back; Reeve, as a back, was somewhat weak in tackling but kicked powerfully when clearing; Ventharn, a newcomer as back, showed pluck and promise, but needs more experience; Tilford, in goal, was a plucky and dependable custodian.

The second eleven, under the paternal eye of their captain, Kelly, won five of their matches. They rarely managed to get th same team two weeks running, and team work suffered.
