Science Society.

This Society started its career at the end of the Autumn Term, and has had a very successful first season. The plan of the Society has been to hold general meetings for all members to hear and discuss papers on subjects of general interest; also to split into a number of small sections to cater for the special interests of individual members.

The total membership of the Society at the end of the Spring Term was 76. Five general meetings have been held; the average attendance has been 28. The papers read were (1) "On the Construction of Primary Batteries," by Mr. A. Robins; (2) "Sound Ranging," by Mr. E. Munton; (3) "Short Wave Transmission and Reception," by Mr. C. C. L. Dixon; (4) "Chemical Manures," by Mr. J. D. Rowden; (5) "Reproduction of Sound, with special reference to the gramophone," by Major F. D. Berridge.

The readers of the papers have been two present boys, one old boy, one master, and one visitor. The papers were of a consistently high standard, and very interesting. The thoroughly expert character of C. C. L. Dixon's paper on short

wave lengths, coming from a boy still at school, is specially worthy of mention.

The numerous sections have been doing good work.

The Photographic Section (27 members) have had weekly meetings. Mr. Lock has given a number of talks on the teaching of photography. There has been a competition for the best photographs taken during the Term, an account of which appears elsewhere in this issue.

The Natural History Section (membership 20), under the direction of Mr. Court, have been making good use of a library consisting mainly of books lent by Mr. Court and other members, and have also been observing.

The Handicraft Section (membership 15) is in charge of C. Elson, and has received valuable assistance from Mr. Court. They have already made a set of shelves for the science library, and a notice board for the Society. A rain gauge is nearly finished. Other work planned for the present Term includes a case for the meteorological instruments and a stand for a telescope.

The Meteorological Section (membership 6) was started by C. S. Pope, and afterwards directed by J. C. Kingcome. Regular observations of the barometer, thermometer, rain gauge, hygrometer, wind and cloud have been made and recorded. A maximum and minimum thermometer has just been obtained. The rain gauge observations are to be forwarded to the Board of Agriculture.

The Wireless Section (membership 20) was started towards the end of last Term by C. C. L. Dixon. A meeting was held, at which experiments were done in transmission.

The Society owes much to the energy of the Secretary and Committee, and it is hoped that it may be an interesting permanent feature of school life.

The Steeplechase.

The Steeplechase was run on February 13th over the usual course through Moor Park (4 2-5 miles). H. E. W. Kirby was the first home of the 125 boys who finished, his time being 27 minutes 59 seconds. The first Junior was E. J. Williams, and A. H. Smith the first of the boys who were under the age of 11 years 6 months on 31st July, 1928.

The points for the Inter-House Competition were reckoned as in previous years. Cricket Notes.

The past season has been a very remarkable one in many respects. I think I am correct in saying that never before has the School 1st XI. scored so many runs in their various games. During the past season the 200 mark has been exceeded on more than one occasion. This heavy scoring has been due to the excellence of two or three members, not to a general all round batting strength; though, in common fairness to the "tail-end," it must be said that towards the end of the season they never had an opportunity of showing what they could do. This extraordinary happening was due to the prolific scoring of the opening pair, Kingcome and Carter, who on at least three occasions completed 150 runs before being parted. The play of these two batsmen and the splendid understanding between them have been amongst the most pleasing features of the season.

J. C. Kingcome, the Captain, has had a very excellent season; finding his form almost at once, he has been the mainstay of his side. He exceeded the 100 on two occasions, narrowly missing it on a third—by the way, these were consecutive innings. He has broken all School records, in that he has scored over 600 runs, making an average for the season of over 50.

D. J. Carter, who, as mentioned before, has ably seconded his efforts, also succeeded in reaching the century. These three centuries in one season are surely another record for the School. In addition to these two batsmen, C. Smith has done some very good work. Unfortunately this remarkable batting has not been followed up, for our bowling has been below the average, and our fielding poor. In fact, in this latter department our XI. has been very disappointing. However, there have been exceptions, among whom Wing is perhaps most worthy of mention. It was this weakness that lost us one or two matches.

Old Farnhamians' Association.

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THE ANNUAL DINNER.

School days, some not many years past, and others well back into the last century, were recalled at the second annual dinner of the Old Farnhamians' Association in the Bush Hotel on Saturday evening, January 28th. There was a happy gathering of between fifty and sixty members, over which Mr. F. A. Morgan (President of the Association and Headmaster of the School) presided, supported by Mr. R. W. Mason (Chairman of the School Governors), Mr. G. H. Bacon, and Mr. F. O. Meddows Taylor (Hon. Secs. of the Association), Messrs. H. C. Kingcome, G. H. Ridout, and R. B. Varey (members of the School Staff), Mr. H. A. Benson, and Mr. G. Maxwell Aylwin.

PROPOSED "OLD BOYS' SCHOLARSHIP."

The loyal toast having been submitted by the Chairman, and duly honoured, Mr. Benson rose to propose "The Old Farnhamians' Association." He had only been a member of the Association for the past six weeks, he said, and he therefore fully appreciated the honour conferred upon him to submit the toast. He was proud of the good fellowship which existed between the Old Boys and the Masters, and of the active interest the Old Boys still took in the School. To those who did not know, he pointed out that the Association attended to the various branches of sport, such as football, cricket, shooting and swimming. The two predominant features, however, were its sentimental and national associations. As regards the sentimental he urged the Old Boys not to forget their school days. Mr. Morgan came to the School as Headmaster he found that there was no School song, and had at once set about to provide one. He (Mr. Benson) pointed out that when he was at School there were School songs (hear, hear), and he thought it was a pity that they should have let those things slide. Speaking of the boys who were about to leave School and start out on life. Mr. Benson said he thought that they, as an Association, ought to do the "big brother business" and give them a helping hand. He could not see why the Association should not be able to provide an Old Boys' Scholarship, and in that way help to push the present day boys through to the Universities. (Hear, hear). Sentiment, he observed, was a great thing in life. Then there was the national side. Previous to and since the Great War there had been a strong desire to form associations. The Government had supported the feeling, and the various professions had adopted the idea. Physicians, engineers, opticians had all formed their associations, and in that way the public, too, had benefited. Why could not they (the Old Farnhamians) pull their weight like these various professions were doing? He urged them to support the School Governors in all their efforts for the good of the School. After three years' hard work on the part of Mr. Bacon, the Association was only 195 members in strength. He advised them to "think big," and treble that membership. He appealed to all Old Boys, wherever they might be, to fall in line. All this could not be achieved without an effort. could not expect to get anything out of the Association without putting something in. He coupled with the toast the names of Mr. Morgan, Mr. Mason, Mr. Bacon and Mr. Brooker.

BENEFITS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

Responding to the toast, Mr. C. N. Brooker (Treasurer of the Association) said he was afraid that a lot went to such functions as these—the dinners and dances—but did not attend the general meetings. He advised them to do so, as he assured them they would derive much benefit from them. There they had the opportunity of meeting "old so-and-so," who was quite a harmless sort of fellow at school, and is now a solicitor (laughter), or another who at school was quite an ordinary chap and is now a schoolmaster. (Renewed laughter). It was all very interesting, and it was a very fine thing to have an Association such as theirs. They hoped soon to see their football team in the Amateur Cup Competition, and columns in the paper about their Rifle Club at Bisley. (Laughter and applause). Speaking of the membership, he believed the Committee were talking of giving a gold plate to the member who brought in the 500th member. He gave the assurance that the Association would do their best to give the boys leaving the School a helping hand. (Applause).

In submitting the toast of "The School," Mr. Mason referred to it as "my dear old school." Referring to Mr. Morgan's eloquent speech at the recent Venison Dinner, Mr. Mason said he considered that speech had been made to the "spirits of the other world." Thinking of such spirits he (Mr. Mason) called to mind Mr. Charles Stroud, one-time Headmaster of the School, whose memory he treasured. If they could get in touch with him and ask him if he remembered their humble servant he

would most probably reply, "Oh, yes, I believe I do. He was an impudent kind of boy. The boy who, when I asked him what the body was composed of, said, 'The head, chest, and bowels,' and who said that the bowels were made up of five parts—a, e, i, o, u." (Laughter).

PASSED BEYOND.

Mr. Mason went on to recall the words of an old song which ran, "Where is now the merry party I remember long ago sitting round the merry fire some have gone from us for ever." In the past year, he said, no fewer than three of his old schoolmates had passed Beyond. There was George Sampson, a name honoured in that town. He was a clergyman, and only that day he (Mr. Mason) had received a tribute to him, words which meant as high a tribute as any man could wish to have. Then there was the Rev. Robert Barrett, who was a peculiar boy at school, but became a much loved clergyman. One name, too, which they ought to honour was George Sturt, who so recently had passed to his rest-he, who in the name of "George Bourne" had written books that all ought to read. There was that book which he especially brought to mind, "A Small Boy in the Sixties," which might have been his (Mr. Mason's) own history. Some might say it was "perfect piffle," but it was no such thing. It was a charming book of the times when he was at school. George Sturt was a man of peculiarly beautiful character.

Speaking of some of the older Old Boys of the School, who ought all, he said, to be members of the Association, Mr. Mason said that he was nearly the oldest of them. He went to school as a boy in the sixties, and he was proud of it. He had gone right up the ladder of the School, and now held the proud position of Chairman of the Governors—he could not hold a prouder

position. (Applause).

Was he dreaming when he recalled the old School in West Street, which now belonged to their sisters? Was he dreaming when he could remember the old wooden stairs and the headmaster who flourished an old chalky duster? Then there was his last term, which he had spent in a kiln in Factory Yard and the old chimes that used to ring-and they used to wait until the chimes were nearly down before going to School! Now they had got on to the School which they now possessed--a grand School he called it. In his days there had been no playing field, except in the Park, and they had no football. Now, here he was, standing before a gathering of Old Boys—a very Old Boy, but feeling as young as ever. He thought they ought to be proud that they had an Old Boy as Chairman of the Governors. The other Governors had been very kind and had insisted on him (Mr. Mason) having that office. He was also proud of the gathering that evening, for they looked a remarkably intelligent lot of young fellows. There was no reason why, under the able leadership of Mr. Morgan, they should not make

the School one of the best in the South of England. He was quite willing to give up his position as Chairman of the Governors if he thought the School were going to benefit by it. Even if he did so he would still have its welfare as much at heart as ever. (Applause).

Association Doing Well.

In reply, Mr. Morgan spoke of the proposed Old Boys' Scholarship, and said that he hoped they might provide a fund to enable one boy a year to go, not only to Oxford and Cambridge, but to London University for an engineering or science scholarship. (Hear, hear). When he looked round at that gathering he felt very proud that they were such a big company. The Association had been going for only three years, and he thought they were doing very well. He spoke of the great help Mr. Mason had been to him during his four years as headmaster of the School, and said he had inquired into the history of previous headmasters. The only headmaster he could find who had been mentioned in history was Dr. Lord, who was appointed in 1800. He brought 12 private pupils along with him and refused to admit free scholars, with the result that in five years there were no scholars at all, and he was still drawing his salary!

Mr. Morgan went on to refer to those who had done the spade work in putting the Association on its legs, and made particular mention of Mr. Bacon, who, he said, in the course of his work, had written so many letters that he shuddered to

think of the number. (Laughter and applause).

Later in the evening the arrival of Mr. Wm. Stroud, beloved by the great number of Old Boys who had had the privilege of being taught by him, was the signal for pandemonium to break loose. All joined in the singing of "For he's a jolly good fellow," and these hearty strains gave way to mighty cheers. When he could be heard, Mr. Stroud, in his usual modest fashion, briefly returned thanks. He was complimented by the singing of "For he's a jolly good fellow," followed by three great cheers and a "tiger."

A musical programme, arranged by Mr. G. H. Ridout, was contributed to by Mr. Ernest Barnard and Mr. S. R. Whetman, whilst community singing was also greatly enjoyed. The pianoforte accompaniments were played by Mr. H. P. N. Mann.

The evening concluded with the singing of the School Song,

Auld Lang Syne, and the National Anthem.

AUTUMN TERM RE-UNION.

The Association held the autumn term re-union at the School on Saturday, December 17th. The football match against the School was won by the Old Boys' XI. 4—1.

Quite a fair number of Old Boys were present at the match. The team which represented the Old Farnhamians in the Farnham and District League was called upon as little as possible as it was felt that their strength would have made the game

too one-sided to be interesting. As it was the School side were defeated by four goals to one. The Old Boys deserved their win, but to say that they were the better side would be to stretch the point. The School served up the best football, but the Old Farnhamians won because of their fearlessness in front of goal. The whole fact of the matter was that a heavy frost had rendered the surface of the ground as hard as cast iron, making foothold exceedingly difficult and a heavy fall far from being pleasant. The younger side, therefore, felt their way somewhat timidly, and in front of goal this proved fatal. Kingcome, a capable leader of the attack under normal conditions, was completely eclipsed on this occasion when he moved about like a man on skates for the first time-fearful lest he should stumble. Pink, the opposing leader, made a complete contrast and seemed to care not whether he fell or kept his balance. The fact that he occasionally sent the ball soaring high and wide of the mark is completely overshadowed by the fact that he did try. In mentioning these two, we do so, not because they were the most conspicuous players, but because they were excellent examples of the contrast between the play of the two sides. That contrast was the sole reason why the Old Boys won. In passing, a word of praise is due to Newman for his great display of pluck and endurance at centre-half for the School. He also received excellent support from Thompson, on his right, whilst Till was easily the best of the Present Boys' front line.

Owing to the late arrival of members of the Old Boys' side, short time was played, and even so the senior team started the game with only seven players. Although short, the Old Boys did the pressing in the opening stages, and King opened the scoring for them when he followed up his shot which had been saved by Smith, to shoot through over the top of the prostrate goalie. Before half-time Hardy equalised with a really good shot from a pass from the right.

Early in the second half Barnard delivered a splendid shot, which Smith beat out, only to see Pink dash up and slip the ball past him. Then Pink forged his way through the School defence to pave the way for another goal, which Barnard netted from King's pass. In the last minute Barnard scored again, and this time with a fine cross shot.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

After tea, kindly arranged by the Headmaster and Mrs. Morgan, the annual general meeting was held in the School Dining Hall. Some 50 members were present, the Headmaster (Capt. F. A. Morgan, M.C., M.A.) presiding.

The Membership Secretary (Mr. G. H. Bacon) reported that the membership was steadily increasing, the present number being 181, a net increase during the year of 54. This is very satisfactory, considering that the Association came into being in 1925.

After the presentation by the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. C. N. Brooker) and adoption of the statement of accounts, the meeting received the reports of the various sub-committees. L. E. Furlonger gave a brief account of the progress of the Old Farnhamians' football team. The team is now second in Division I. of the Farnham and District League, and, under the captaincy of Mr. A. W. Ball, shows every promise of completing a successful season. The President congratulated all those concerned in the work of the Club, and moved from the chair a most sincere vote of thanks to Mr. C. E. Borelli for his kind permission to use Stonyfields in Waverley Road as a ground. Mr. G. H. Ridout, for the Entertainment Sub-Committee, stated that two successful dances had been held during the and that a satisfactory profit had been handed over to the Association Funds. Mr. E. C. Patrick, Hon. Secretary of the Miniature Rifle Club, in his report, urged that more members should take advantage of the facilities for rifle shooting offered by the Club, which holds weekly meetings in the School Miniature Rifle Range. He stated that it was hoped to arrange matches with other Clubs next year, and possibly monthly spoon shoots amongst the members. The President, in thanking Mr. Patrick for his efforts, mentioned that the Club and the Association were very much indebted to Major H. C. Patrick for his generous gift of a challenge cup for individual competition.

VICE-PRESIDENTS AS HON. MEMBERS.

The meeting then proceeded to a revision of the rules of the Association, in the light of experience gained during the past two years. Several alterations and additions were made. As the Association elects as its Vice-Presidents gentlemen whom it wishes to honour for services to the School, it was unanimously agreed that such Vice-Presidents should most fittingly be honorary members of the Association. Patrick was co-opted on to the Committee. It was resolved to send a letter of good wishes to Mr. G. A. Ashton, who left the School last term to take up a mastership at Monmouth Grammar School.

The general meeting was followed by a debate. Mr. F. O. Meddows Taylor moved, and Mr. J. Peters seconded, "That the Old Farnhamians' Association does not arouse as much interest as it should." The opposer was Mr. E. C. Patrick, and his seconder Mr. D. W. Blackmore. A lively and entertaining discussion followed, Mr. A. L. Fisher, in the chair, contributing both consciously and unconsciously to the general enjoyment of the proceedings. It was somewhat difficult to decide on which side a member spoke, but probably owing to telling speeches by Messrs. J. M. Taylor, A. T. F. Funnell and K. T. Mitchell, with the weighty support of the Chairman, and in spite of some vigorous criticisms by Mr. C. T. Stroud, the motion was lost by 17 votes to three.

SPRING TERM RE-UNION.

Ridout, for the Entertainments Committee, announced that he had been able to hand over to the General Purposes Fund a sum of over £5 as a result of the last Association dance.

Mr. E. C. Patrick urged more members to take advantage of the meetings of the Miniature Rifle Club on the School Range. The Club had purchased a rifle, and a successful season was

anticipated.

Mr. J. Peters reported that the Debating Society had made a promising start with two debates, and would re-commence in the autumn.
